Environmental Impact Statement (EIS)

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An EIS evaluates the impacts of a number of reasonable alternatives. The agency is not required to select the alternative with the least impacts. Normally, the EIS process results in three main products: the Draft EIS, the Final EIS and a subsequent Record of Decision.

The Colorado Department of Transportation partners with the appropriate federal agencies (e.g., Federal Highway Administration, for road improvements) to prepare EISs for Colorado transportation projects.
