

Wildlife-Vehicle Collisions

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The Colorado State Patrol (CSP) has reported that collisions with wildlife are the third-leading cause of vehicle crashes in the state. Wildlife-vehicle collisions are on the increase as the State's human population continues to grow. More than 4,000 crashes involving wildlife have been reported annually in recent years, and numerous crashes likely went unreported. This is a staggering toll of tragedy for humans and animals alike.

To avoid such crashes, motorists should obey speed limits, heed warning signs, and be especially alert during the fall months when animals are mating and moving to winter habitat ranges. Also, remember that dawn and dusk are particularly dangerous times when the animals are difficult to see. Report any wildlife crash promptly to CSP, so that the data can be used to identify and mark high-risk areas.

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
